
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



You could go around your
house or an outside area with an
adult and practise listening

you hear. Talk about what you
heard. Did you recognise all the

Make a collection of your
own noise makers. Think about lots
of different things that make a sound
and gather them together in a box or bag.
Use one of the objects to make a sound for
others to guess and identify. You could
include things like crisp packets, keys,
