Weekly Activities

Geography

Our theme this term is Rio De Janerio.

Rio is famous for many things, sculptures and breath taking views but also the Carnival. What do you know about Carnivals/Parades? As a family have an idea collecting session writing your ideas down.

Research the carnival in Rio. What do they celebrate? When is it? An amazing fact is that every neighbourhood presents their own unique dance and costumes and joins the main parade. Describe the colours and themes and emotions of the performers and the spectators.

Next compare this carnival/parade with the New Year's Day Parade in London. What are the similarities and differences between them? Are there any common themes or performances? Record your findings in a mind-map or through a comparing chart.

Don't forget to include some more amazing facts and Did You Know statements. Which event would you rather attend?

RE

This term in RE we are learning about the Key Roles of Leaders in a variety of Religions. We will explore: Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Buddhism and Sikhism. Within each religion is a Leader who has key roles and responsibilities surrounding their Holy Book. They also provide a sources of wisdom, stories and quidance on the way we live.

What is wisdom?

Discuss this with your family. Share your views and ideas

This week you will explore the religion Hinduism. Who is the Key Leader?

What Holy Text do they use?

Do they wear any interesting clothes or items? Where is their Holy Place of Worship? What is it like?

Research one of the stories that they would tell others and re-write it in your own words. You can do this through pictures, Comic Strip, drama or song or simply write it down on the page.

You can draw a picture or decorate your page. I would love to hear these traditional stories.

Science

Our Science theme this term is Life Cycles. All animals and insects going through a life cycle, each one with a different number of stages. This process is also called Metamorphosis. What is Metamorphosis? Are there different types? Find out what Metamorphosis is and what different types there are. What are the differences between each one? Which insects follow which one? Once you have identified the different types of Metamorphosis- Choose an insect for each one and explain the changes that they go through. What are the similarities and differences between them? Go out into your garden or when you take your dog for a walk-can you find any of these insects that have been through a complete or incomplete stage of metamorphosis? Keep an insect diary or send me a picture of the ones you find.

Explain to a family member what you have learnt this week. Did anything surprise you?

Art

To link with the topic of Rio and this week's focus is on the carnival. Your task this week is to design and where possible make your very own headdress to wear at the carnival. Think about the colours and textures that you would use. Have a look at some examples and choose items that would be found locally in Rio. Are you going to represent an animal? You can also design you own costume to match your headdress. Perhaps you could record yourself walking down the catwalk wearing your creations and share them with us. Jigsaw

Our Jigsaw theme this term is Relationships.

Share with your family what Jigsaw is in class.

The first task this term is to think about all the different people around you who you can talk to either on the phone or text or via email? What sort of thigs would you talk to them about? Create a list of safe people. Then think about who might not be safe for you to talk to? Where would these people be? Online, in the streets. Remember that when you are playing online you need to ensure that you know who it is that you are talking to and that you are safe. Your task is to create a poster of leaflet to inform other children how to be safe online and about the risks and dangers of talking to people that you don't know. Who can they talk to if they are worried or scared? Who can they report these people to?

Remember that playing games and being online can have positive and negative effects on people and their confidence and self-esteem. What can you do if you are feeling worried or scared?

Ensure that your information poster is bright and full of information- don't forget charities who can help-NSPCC Childline.

Extra Activities for the Half Term

Have a go at these different creative tasks. You can present the work in any way you choose. Why not trying one a week? Ask an adult to take a picture and email it to us or post it on Twitter- We would LOVE to see your amazing creations.

-Find a timetable for a bus, cinema, tv schedule or create your own. Remember it needs a start time, finish time and duration. Stick in onto a piece of paper and write 10 questions of your choice for a family member to answer.

Challenge: Can you include a question that will need a time conversion?

- -Research a traditional dish served in Rio and have a go at making your own? What different ingredients would you need? What different colours of foods and flavours do they use? Write down the recipe and take a picture of your food. I would love to see it.
- Create a poster with a powerful statement to encourage athletes to sign up for the Olympic Games in Rio. Remember it needs to have a catchy slogan and lots of bright colours and interesting facts. Can you persuade them?
- Write an information poster to show at least 5 different animals that are native to Rio De Janerio. Remember to include lots of interesting facts and a picture.
- Create a comparison chart to show the differences between England and Rio. How is the climate different? The weather, the population? Where would you rather live? England or Rio? Why would you choose ths country. Present your information in any way of your choice.
- -Choose a religion of your choice and research a traditional story. Re write the story in your own words and make it as creative as you choose. Why is did you choose this story? Is there a moral or a message that is important in it?
- Make a collage of the different stages in a life cycle- which one will you choose? Remember to label each stage.
- -Choose your favourite sport from the Olympic Games. Complete a case study about a famous athlete who competes. EG 100m Sprint Usain Bolt. Remember to include facts and a picture.
- Create a leaflet or a holiday brochure encouraging people to visit Rio De Janerio. What important information would you need to include? What activities could they do and what important sights would they see?


Take 5: Ideas for Independent/Home Learning

Floodland by Marcus Sedgwick (Orion)

1. Explore it

Look at this image from the opening of the novel:

- What do you notice about this image? What can you see in the picture? Where might it be?
- What do you like about the image? What don't you like? Does it remind you of anything you have seen before, in real life or in other books, or on TV and in film? Do you have any questions about the image?
- What do you think about the word 'before' that accompanies this image? What do you think this refers to? What does this make you think about? How does this connect to the ideas you have about the story?
- Why do you think the novel opens with this image? What does this suggest to you about the story that will unfold? What impression is made on you by this image? From whose viewpoint may this image be taken?
- Now look at the front cover and title of the book. What does this make you think about? What is a flood? What do you think the title, Floodland means? How does this relate to the image you have looked at? Does it confirm or challenge any of the initial ideas you had?

2. Illustrate it

Read the opening to this novel:

'Zoe ran. Harder than she had ever run in her life. Her feet pounded through the deserted streets of derelict buildings. Somewhere, not far behind, she could hear the gang coming after her. It felt as if her heart would burst, but she didn't slow down. She'd been planning to leave the island for a long time, but had been putting it off. It was a big decision to set out to sea in a tiny rowing boat. Now she had no choice.

Before, no one had bothered her. Zoe was a loner. Most of the people left on Norwich hung around together in groups. But she preferred to be on her own. It was safer that way, because you never knew whom you could trust. Somehow, someone had found out about the boat she'd been hiding. A boat was an escape route, a way to get away from Norwich, which got smaller every year, as the sea kept on rising. It didn't matter that there could only be room for two people at most in her boat. Others had joined in the chase, and now a mob of about fifteen people was hot on her heels. There was only one way out; to get to her boat before they got to her.'





Re-read the passage, or ask someone to read it to you, or maybe record it for yourself so you can play it over again. What do you feel or think when you read or hear this?

After you have read the extract a few times, think about what you can see in your imagination — people, places, objects or events, whatever stood out most to you. Then take a pen or pencil and a bit of scrap paper. You can use the back of an old envelope, letter or cereal packet; whatever is to hand if you don't have paper. Draw what you see in your imagination; anything that captures the place and the mood of this story opening. Remember, everyone has their own ideas and imagines things their own way. This is a good thing!

Add to your illustration any words and phrases that have helped you make your picture, which might come from the passage or from your own imagination.

3. Talk about it

- Think about the text again. How has the author created a sense of drama and intrigue in this opening? What do you notice about the way in which the paragraphs are structured? What is the impact of the mix of long and short sentences? How do these make you feel?
- How did you imagine the events as you read the passage? What helped you to imagine this? Does it remind you of anything you have read before? Or anything you may have watched? What do you predict will happen in the story?
- Think about the adjectives used by the author to describe the place, 'deserted' and 'derelict'. What do these mean? Use a dictionary to look these up or an online dictionary, such as: https://www.oxfordlearnersdictionaries.com/. What do these words make you think about this place?
- Now think about the text and the illustration together. Was this what you expected to accompany this picture?

4. Imagine it

Think about this line in the text: A boat was an escape route, a way to get away from Norwich, which got smaller every year, as the sea kept on rising.

Have a look at the map of Norwich below. Does it make sense, given what you can see, that Zoe would need a boat to escape Norwich? Why do you think she refers to Norwich as an Island? What does this suggest to you about what has happened in the book?

Looking at this map, what do you notice about the geography of this location? Can you imagine what could have happened to the sea levels to create such devastation that Norwich has become surrounded by water?



5. Create it

Marcus Sedgwick was inspired to write this novel in response to climate change.

Can you plan some small ways in which you can help prevent climate change? For example, record what items you use on a daily basis that use single use plastic such as a plastic cup. Can you think about possible alternatives that you could use instead? Are there other ways in which you can reduce, reuse or recycle the items you use on a daily basis to limit your impact on the planet? Once you have discovered these you may want to share these ideas with other people you know.



Where is Rio de Janeiro?


Rio de Janeiro is the second largest city in the country called Brazil. Brazil can be found in the continent of South America.




History

Christ the Redeemer Statue in Tijuca Forest




Sugarloaf Mountain in Guanabara Bay




Food

- **Feijoada** is a traditional dish made with meat and black beans. It is usually served in Rio on Wednesdays and Saturdays.
- A local favourite is **feijao com arroz** or beans and rice.
- Tutu a Mineira is made with flour and bean paste and is served in all traditional Brazilian restaurants.
- Polenta, couve and bisteca can all be found on the menu of local restaurants.
- **Salgadinhos** usually consist of cheese bread, chicken croquettes, meat cakes, pasteis and empanadas.
- Sweets include **cuscuz branco**, tapioca with sugar and coconut milk and pao de mel a honey cake covered in chocolate.
