INCLUSIVE TRUST ECO SUMMIT 2024

This week, our fantastic Eco-Council, The Green Cherries, attended the Trust Eco-Summit at The

Salvation Army, Watford. They joined with pupils from Laurance Haines and Beechfield to learn about Water Conservation.



They spent a productive morning identifying

important water related issues at school and created a pledge for action. They were also lucky to hear from Governor, Adem Baysal, about rare chalk streams and ways to protect our precious water.

They developed a slogan 'Only take what you need' and pledged to:

- Use water butts to collect rainwater
- Report leaky loos (around 400 million litres of water leaks from UK toilets every day!)
- Be ambassadors and share the message with family and friends about water conservation.

FLU VACCINATION FOR RECEPTION TO YEAR 6

This winter, the School Immunisation Team will be visiting our school on Tuesday, 26th November, to offer the annual flu vaccination to all children in Reception through Year 6. The vaccination, which can help prevent flu and reduce its spread to vulnerable people, is offered as a quick, painless nasal spray. For those preferring a gelatine-free option, an injectable vaccine is also available.

To give consent for your child, please complete the econsent form online at <u>this link</u> as soon as possible. Please note that the consent portal will close 48 hours before the school session.

Flu can cause serious health issues in children, such as pneumonia. Vaccination helps protect your child, family, and friends from this illness. Please ensure you complete the form to help keep our community safe this winter.

STEM HERO OF THE MONTH - CELEBRATING MARIE CURIE

This month, we celebrate Marie Curie not only because this month marks her birthday, but also for her invention of the portable X-ray machine.

Known as the "Mother of Modern Physics," she led

groundbreaking research in radiation that led to significant medical advancements. During World War I, she saw the need for portable X-ray machines on the battlefield and created "Little Curies" to help surgeons locate injuries.



Her legacy continues to inspire the life-saving potential of science.

Year 1

Writing - writing letters to important people.

Phonics - learning some new phase 5 sounds; a-e in shake, i-e in time, o-e in home, u-e in rude and cute e-e in these, ew in chew and new. ie in shield, aw in claw.

Maths - looking at parts and wholes.

Science - exploring properties of materials.

Wider Curriculum - learning about some famous castles in the UK and exploring their features.

Year 2

Writing - writing and publishing our recounts of The Great Fire of London.

Maths - to add and subtract ones and tens to and from 2-digit numbers.

Science - explore how materials can change shape and investigate the suitability of everyday materials.

Wider Curriculum - investigating how London has changed since The Great Fire of London.

Guided Reading – 'The Green Ship' by Quentin Blake.

Year 3

Writing - exploring the features of an explanation text and writing an explanation text about "How Rocks Are Formed".

Maths - learning how to subtract using column subtraction.

Science – identifying and conducting a scientific investigation based on the properties of different types of rocks.

Wider Curriculum - learning about Stone Age houses and settlements.

Guided Reading - 'Journey to Jo'Burg' by Beverly Naidoo.

Year 4

Writing – writing narratives with characters, settings and plot.

Maths – multiplying and dividing by 10 and 100 including decimal numbers and units of measure for mass, capacity and length.

Science – the functions of the digestive system and about the different types of teeth and their functions.

Wider Curriculum - why the Romans invaded Britian and what life was like for a Roman soldier.

Guided Reading – 'The Firework Makers Daughter' by Phillip Pullman.

Year 5

Writing – exploring the features of narratives including character and setting descriptions and creating atmosphere.

Maths – problem solving involving the 4 operations.

Science – investigating friction force on different surfaces and carrying out scientific enquiries.

Wider Curriculum - exploring where the Vikings came from and why they invaded.

Guided Reading – 'Kensuke's Kingdom' by Micheal Morpurgo.

Year 6

Writing – writing discussion texts exploring whether workhouses were a good idea in Victorian Britain.

Maths – how to use the formal method to multiply by 2 and 3-digit numbers.

Science – investigating the effects of adding additional electrical components to an electrical circuit

Wider Curriculum - researching the Victorian Era and the rise and fall of the British Empire

Guided Reading – 'Private Peaceful' by Michael Morpurgo.
