


CONGRATULATIONS MS PARLES


NURSERY ADMISSIONS 2025-26

STEM HERO OF THE MONTH -ALEXANDER GRAHAM BELL

Have you ever wondered if you could survive without a telephone?

We owe a lot to one particularly curious child who was born in Edinburgh in 1847—Alexander Graham Bell. When Alexander's mother became deaf, he developed a keen interest in



acoustics-the science of sound-at just 12 years old.

As an adult, Alexander continued working with the deaf and hard of hearing, especially as his wife was also deaf. By 1875, he had created a simple receiver that could turn electricity into sound. Although other inventors were working on similar ideas, Alexander was the first to patent the telephone. Just a few days later, in March 1876, he made the world's first telephone call!



What we are learning......

For EYFS, please see updates on your weekly letters and Tapestry.

Year 1

Writing - our own version of the 'Enormous Turnip'.

Phonics - /or/ in water, /o/ in want, /air/ in bear there, /ur/ learn, /r/ wrist, /s/ whistle science, /er/ actor.

Maths - find the missing part in addition and subtraction stories.

Science - looking closely at seeds and finding out what happens when we plant them.

Wider Curriculum – finding out about William Morris the printmaker and how he was inspired by nature.

Year 4

Writing - character descriptions before moving on to look at our new text 'The man who walked between the wires' and writing a newspaper report based around this text.

Maths - formal written multiplication before moving onto division.

Science - focusing on what humans can do to reduce climate change.

Wider Curriculum - looking at Niagara Falls and the Taj Mahal as part of our landmarks topic.

Guided Reading – 'The Borrowers' by Mary Norton.

Year 2

Writing- using 'Goldilocks and Just the One Bear' story to write our own narratives.

Maths - subtracting two-digit numbers and finding the missing part in subtraction problems.

Science – find out what bulbs need to grow into healthy plants and how and why plants disperse their seeds.

Wider Curriculum – looking at fairy tale maps and visiting Waddesdon manor.

Guided Reading - 'The No. 1 Car Spotter' by Atinuke.

Year 5

Writing – writing spooky narratives based upon 'Room 13'.

Maths - calculating percentages of amounts and problem solving.

Science - we will look at separating materials and reversible and irreversible changes.

Wider Curriculum - identifying and describing sculptures and exploring how Leavesden has been used as inspiration for artists at Leavesden Country Park.

Guided Reading - 'The Lion above the Door' by Onjali Rauf.

Year 3

Writing – writing a recount in the perspective of Wesley from the book "Weslandia".

Maths - finding fractions of amounts and ordering fractions.

Science - researching what can be recycled and planning how we can share this information.

Wider Curriculum - exploring the significance of the pyramids in Ancient Egypt and finding out about Howard Carter's discovery of Tutankhamun.

Guided Reading - 'You're a Bad Man Mr Gum' by Andy Stanton.

Year 6

Writing - exploring and writing our own free verse poems.

Maths - solving scaling problems and calculating and comparing volume.

Science - looking at early ideas about classification and investigating the behaviour of microorganisms.

Wider Curriculum -investigating examples of WWII propaganda and its meanings.

Guided Reading - tackling reading comprehension problems.

For this special event, children in Year 3 to Year 6 should come to school in their uniform as usual.
